

BRADFIELD ST. GEORGE is a parish 1 mile north-east from Whelnetham railway station and 5 south-east from Bury St. Edmunds, in the North Western division of the county, Thingoe and Thedwestry petty sessional division, Thedwestry hundred, Thingoe union, Bury St. Edmunds county court district, Horningsheath rural deanery, Sudbury archdeaconry and diocese of Ely. The church of St. George is a structure of flint and stone in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch, north aisle and western embattled tower with pinnacles, containing 5 bells: there are 240 sittings. The register dates from the year 1568. The living is a rectory, with that of Rushbrooke annexed, joint net yearly value arising from tithe rent-charge, £500 with 16 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Marquess of Bristol, and held since 1884 by the Rev. George Francis Turner M.A. Trinity College, Oxford, J.P. rural dean of Horningsheath, and hon. canon of Ely. The rectory is a handsome residence, near the church. West Lodge, the seat of Walter Orbell Palmer esq. is a fine Gothic mansion of red

GREAT BRADLEY is a parish situated on the Cambridgeshire border and on the Stour, 6½ miles north from Haverhill railway station and 8 south from Newmarket, in the Southern division of the county, Risbridge hundred, petty sessional division and union, Haverhill county court district, rural deanery of Thurlow, Sudbury archdeaconry and diocese of Ely. The church of St. Mary is a building of stone and flint in the Perpendicular style, and consists of chancel, nave, south porch and south square tower containing 3 bells: the chancel was repaired in 1864, and has 150 sittings. The register dates from the year 1560. The living is a rectory, tithe rent-charge £626, with 47 acres of glebe, in the gift of the trustees of the late Rev. J. McM. Wilder, and held since 1881 by the Rev. John Trafalgar

LITTLE BRADLEY is a parish 6½ miles north from Haverhill railway station, in the Southern division of the county, Risbridge hundred, petty sessional division and union, Haverhill county court district, rural deanery of Thurlow, archdeaconry of Sudbury and diocese of Ely. The church of All Saints is a small ancient building of flint in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and western embattled circular tower with 1 bell, and contains a memorial brass to John Daye, the printer, who died at Walden, in Essex, in 1584: in the chancel is a monument to Richard Lehunter, who died 1540: in 1879 the church was thoroughly restored, at a cost of about £900: the whole of the windows are stained, one of which was given in memory of John Daye by the Stationers' Company, of Alston Rev. Herbert M.A. [rector]

BRADWELL is a parish and village, seated on a height, 3 miles south-south-west from Yarmouth (Southtown) station and 8 north-west from Lowestoft, in the Northern division of the county, hundred, petty sessional division and incorporation of Mutford and Lothingland, Great Yarmouth county court district, rural deanery of Lothingland, Suffolk archdeaconry and Norwich diocese. The church of St. Nicholas is a structure of flint with stone dressings, in the Later Decorated style, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, south porch and low round western tower containing 3 bells: in 1875 a partial restoration of the church was effected, the old pews removed and open benches substituted, with pulpit, reading-desk and chancel stalls of corresponding design; an open-timbered roof was also placed in the chancel: there are 250 sittings. The register dates from the year 1616. The living is a rectory, tithe rent-charge £632, net yearly value £462, including 12 acres of glebe, in the gift of and held since 1864 by the Rev. John Walker M.A. of St. John's Col-
